



BACKGROUND / PURPOSE

Andrew and Cynthia Quinn own a 98 acre parcel of land being Lot 18, Concession 1 on the boundary of McKellar Township in the Municipality of Whitestone.



This parcel of land is accessed by a legal, registered right-of way from Balsam Road, through Lot 18, Concession 14 in the Township of McKellar and along the shared municipal road allowance.






The proposed consent is to create one (1) new Rural, accessed by the existing road and along the municipal road allowance.

EXISITNG LOT CONDITIONS






The air photos above show the lot conditions. The lot is mostly hardwood forest with low areas throughout the large acreage.

The lands have been predominantly used for hunting. The division line has been well thought out with the owners' intimate knowledge the "lay of the land". There is an existing, off-grid, dwelling (306 Balsam Road) located on the proposed severed lot. The retained lands may remain vacant or may be developed with a similar off-grid dwelling.

HISTORIC SEVERANCE

The subject lands are a result of application No. B26 2008 (W), a historic severance where two 100 acre lots, that had previously merged, were re-divided.



A right-of-way was registered and agreements to cross and improve the municipal road allowance were signed with both municipalities.

A copy of the consent decision is attached to this report.

OFFICIAL PLAN

The subject lands are designated Rural in the Municipality's Official Plan.

There are no natural heritage features identified on the mapping schedules in the Official Plan.

The Official Plan allows lot creation on private roads. A municipal road allowance is a public highway under the Municipal Act and can provide legitimate access so long as the proper agreements are in place as was done as a condition of the previous consent.

PROVINCIAL PLANNING STATEMENT (P.P.S)

These lands are considered Rural lands in the Provincial Planning Statement. Rural lot creation is supported by this document. and are subject to following policies:

2.5 Rural Areas in Municipalities

- 1. Healthy, integrated and viable rural areas should be supported by:
 - a) building upon rural character, and leveraging rural amenities and assets;
 - b) promoting regeneration, including the redevelopment of brownfield sites;
 - c) accommodating an appropriate range and mix of housing in rural settlement areas;
 - d) using rural infrastructure and public service facilities efficiently;
 - e) promoting diversification of the economic base and employment opportunities through goods and services, including value-added products and the sustainable management or use of resources;
 - f) providing opportunities for sustainable and diversified tourism, including leveraging historical, cultural, and natural assets;
 - g) conserving biodiversity and considering the ecological benefits provided by nature; and
 - h) providing opportunities for economic activities in prime agricultural areas, in accordance with policy 4.3.
- 2. In rural areas, rural settlement areas shall be the focus of growth and development and their vitality and regeneration shall be promoted.
- 3. When directing development in rural settlement areas in accordance with policy 2.3, planning authorities shall give consideration to locally appropriate rural characteristics, the scale of development and the provision of appropriate service levels.

Growth and development may be directed to rural lands in accordance with policy 2.6, including where a municipality does not have a settlement area.

2.6 Rural Lands in Municipalities


- 1. On rural lands located in municipalities, permitted uses are:
 - a) the management or use of resources;
 - b) resource-based recreational uses (including recreational dwellings not intended as permanent residences);
 - c) residential development, including lot creation, where site conditions are suitable for the provision of appropriate sewage and water services;
 - d) agricultural uses, agriculture-related uses, on-farm diversified uses and normal farm practices, in accordance with provincial standards;
 - e) home occupations and home industries;
 - f) cemeteries; and
 - g) other rural land uses.
- 2. Development that can be sustained by rural service levels should be promoted.
- 3. Development shall be appropriate to the infrastructure which is planned or available, and avoid the need for the uneconomical expansion of this infrastructure.
- 4. Planning authorities should support a diversified rural economy by protecting agricultural and other resource-related uses and directing non-related development to areas where it will minimize constraints on these uses.
- 5. New land uses, including the creation of lots, and new or expanding livestock facilities, shall comply with the minimum distance separation formulae.

Although off-grid development is not specifically referenced, the statement supports a broad range of development and housing opportunities.

As mentioned, it is not clear whether the retained lands will be developed or remain vacant, but hunt camps have been a long standing and accepted land use in rural municipalities, including Whitestone.

ZONING BY-LAW

The subject lands are zoned Rural (RU) in the Municipality's Zoning By-law. The proposed lot meets the Rural standard of 100 metres frontage (road allowance) and 2.0 hectares in area.



RECOMMENDATIONS

That the proposed consent to allow the creation of one (1) new rural lot in Lot 18, Concession 1, 306 Balsam Road as applied for by Andrew and Cynthia Quinn in Application No. B21/2025(W) be approved subject to the following conditions:

- 1. Payment of a parkland dedication fee be made in accordance with the current Municipal Fees and Charges By-law;
- 2. That the new lot receive 911 addressing from the Municipality;
- 3. That the owner update the agreement to improve and cross the municipal road allowance with the Municipality of Whitestone and the Township of McKellar to include the retained lot;
- 4. Payment of all applicable planning board fees.



A. RECOMMENDATION

That the Council of the Municipality of Whitestone stop-up, close, and sell a portion of the unopened municipal road allowance north of Highway 520 between Lot 35, Concession 1 and 2 (McKenzie), and Lot 1, Concession 1 and 2 (Burton), subject to being satisfied that the application meets the following:

- 1. That the application conforms to Section 10.01 of the Official Plan and the Crown Land to the west of the unopened municipal road allowance is an appropriate alternative access to the other unopened municipal road allowance near the shoreline of Gooseneck Lake and access to the recreational waterbody;
- 2. That the unopened municipal road allowance does not become a separately conveyable lot and that it be merged with the applicant's property by whatever means determined to be appropriate by the municipal solicitor.
- 3. That legal access across the applicant's property (and the municipal unopened road allowance) to the lots that are accessed by McGee Lake Road is maintained. This may involve the registering of an easement over the portion of McGee Lake Road that travels over the municipal road allowance.
- 4. That any costs associated with the sale and transfer of the municipal unopened road allowance be borne by the applicant.

If approved, it is recommended that the practices, procedures and fees of the Municipality for closing of Municipal Road Allowances be followed, including declaring the road allowance to be surplus in accordance with Section 9.04.1 of the Official Plan.

B. PROPOSAL/BACKGROUND





Figure 2: Unopened Road Allowance

An application to purchase an unopened municipal road allowance (the subject lands) has been submitted by Scott and Jennifer Nash, adjacent to their property at Lot 35, Concession 1 and 2 (Roll Nos. 493905000401800 and 493905000403600). The subject lands are legally described as the road allowance between the Township of Burton and the Township of McKenzie east of centre line, south of Gooseneck Lake, Whitestone. The

subject lands are located on the boundary between the Ardberg Neighbourhood and the Wahwashkesh/Whitestone Neighbourhood, and abut lands designated Waterfront, Rural, and Crown Land in the Official Plan. The location of the applicant's property is shown in **Figure 1**, and the unopened municipal road allowance that is proposed to be closed is shown in **Figure 2**.

The applicant's property has a lot area of approximately 55 hectares (135 acres) and does not have lot frontage on Highway 520. The unopened municipal road allowance is approximately 2.7 hectares (6.6 acres) with approximately 20 metres of frontage on Highway 520. The applicants state in the application that by purchasing the unopened municipal road allowance it will allow for better access to their property for a driveway/seasonal road to areas of the property that are currently not accessible unless the road allowance is used. No drawing was provided to show the location of a conceptual driveway/seasonal road location.

The applicant's property does not have lot frontage on Highway 520 currently and the proposal, if approved, would result on the property having lot frontage on Highway 520. The applicant's property is accessed via McKee Lake Road, and it is understood that there is legal access over the applicant's property in favour of the other properties on Gooseneck Lake. The unopened municipal road allowance abuts the property to the south of the applicant's property which currently does have lot frontage on Highway 520.

Figure 1: Applicant's Property

C. OFFICIAL PLAN

Section 9.04 of the Official Plan includes polices regarding municipal road allowances and states that:

Improvements to municipal road allowances that are not maintained are not permitted unless the following occurs:

9.04.1 the Municipality declares the road allowance surplus and the municipal road allowance is stopped up and sold in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Act;

In order to conform to section 9.04.1 of the Official Plan, in order to sell the road allowance, the Municipality would have to declare the road allowance surplus.

Section 10.01 of the Official Plan includes policies regarding parkland and states that:

Council will generally discourage the stopping up and transferring of road allowances that lead to a recreational waterbody unless the use of the road allowance, either now or in the future could not feasibly serve as a public access. Alternatively, an applicant interested in acquiring a particular road allowance leading to water, could provide an alternative access to replace the road allowance.

Section 10.01 of the Official Plan contains a three-part test for considering the sale of a road allowance that leads to a recreational waterbody.

- 1) Does the road allowance lead to a recreational waterbody?
- 2) Would it not be feasible now or in the future to for the road allowance to serve as a public access?

can the applicant provide an alternative access to replace the road allowance?

Analysis of these three tests includes the following:

1) Does the road allowance lead to a recreational waterbody?

The road allowance connects to other road allowances that connect to a recreational waterbody.

2) Would it not be feasible now or in the future for the road allowance to serve as a public access?

Based on the material provided with the application submission, the applicant indicates that the road allowance is the best location to provide better access to his property for areas that are not presently accessible unless the road allowance is used. Based on this information, the road allowance could also facilitate access to Gooseneck Lake. However, a site visit has not been completed to confirm if it would be feasible now, or in the future, for the road allowance to serve as a public access. We are unable to comment on the feasibility of the road allowance to serve as a public access at this time.

3) Or, can the applicant provide an alternative access to replace the road allowance?

The applicant has suggested that an alternative access to replace the road allowance is the Crown Land to the west of the road allowance. Prior to making a decision on the application, Council must be satisfied that that the request conforms to Section 10.01 of the Official Plan, in terms of confirming that the Crown Land to the west is an appropriate alternative to providing access to the recreational waterbody.

According to Schedule B – Natural Heritage, there are no natural heritage features on or adjacent to the subject lands.

Further, it is recommended that the adjacent landowner to the south of the applicant's property and to the east of a portion of the unopened municipal road allowance through the required process under the Municipal Act to determine if they have any comments or also wish to purchase a section of the unopened municipal road allowance.

D. **ZONING BY-LAW**




Figure 3: Zoning By-law Schedule A

The applicant's property is zoned Waterfront Residential 1 – Limited Services (WF1-LS) in the Municipality of Whitestone Zoning By-law, as shown in **Figure 3**.

The applicant's property is currently subject to Section 3.26 of the Zoning By-law because the property does not have lot frontage on an open public highway maintained year-round by the Municipality or public authority. The property also does not have lot frontage on the shoreline of Gooseneck Lake.

Following a review of the provisions of Section 3.26 of the Zoning By-law, a dwelling or a seasonal dwelling would <u>not</u> be permitted on the applicant's property under the exceptions listed in Section 3.26.

Section 3.26 of the Zoning By-law and the exceptions are included below:

- 3.26 Frontage on Public Road or Street No person shall erect any building or structure in any zone unless the lot upon which such building or structure is to be erected fronts upon an open public highway maintained year-round by the Municipality or public authority, except in:
 - a) A Waterfront Zone, a seasonal dwelling unit may front on a navigable waterway subject to the Limited Services provisions of this By-law and any applicable private road agreements and further provided that the right-of-way does not exceed one kilometre in length;
 - b) A Rural (RU) zone, a hunting camp provided there is legal access to the subject lands;
 - c) A commercial or industrial zone, the lot may front upon a private road or right-of-way having a minimum width of 20 metres;
 - d) In a Rural (RU), Rural Industrial (RUI) or Rural Residential (RR) Zone, a dwelling may front upon a private road, registered right-of-way or unassumed road allowance subject to the Limited Services

provisions of this by-law and provided that the access is adequate for year round access and there are agreements in place to indemnify the Municipality from any responsibility or liability for the maintenance of the road.

If Council approves the application to sell the road allowance, the effect of the application would result in the applicant's property having lot frontage on Highway 520. If the applicant's property has lot frontage, then the permitted uses of the WF1 Zone listed under Section 7.01 would apply, including permissions for a single detached dwelling. The Limited Services categorization in the zoning would technical not be applicable.

In summary, the application would provide direct access to Highway 520 and would enable the property to be eligible for a building permit for a dwelling in accordance with Section 3.26 of the Zoning By-law.

E. ANALYSIS AND SUMMARY

The purpose of the application is to request the sale of an unopened road allowance that would facilitate better access to the applicant's property for a driveway/seasonal road to areas that are not accessible without using the road allowance. The application would also enable the lot to comply to the requirements of Section 3.26 of the Zoning By-law and be eligible for a building permit for a dwelling.

In reviewing the application, it is noted that the applicant's property has a private road (McGee Lake Road) that traverses the lot and provides access to lots on Gooseneck Lake. Prior to the sale of the road allowance, it is recommended that the applicant provide a property transcript of the lot to demonstrate that there is a legal right-of-way registered in favour of access to the other properties on Gooseneck Lake. If the existing private road does not provide legal access to the lots on Gooseneck Lake, it may be appropriate to delay the sale of the road allowance until legal access is provided to these lot owners as the road allowance that is requested for sale, could assist in providing access to these property owners.

Further, as part of any sale of the road allowance any easements registered over the applicant's property for access associated with McGee Lake Road, must be extended to cover the area of the road allowance that is occupied by McGee Lake Road.

Following a review of the application and prior to a decision, Council needs to be satisfied of the following item:

1. That the application conforms to Section 10.01 of the Official Plan and the Crown Land to the west of the unopened municipal road allowance satisfies the intent of the alternative access considerations of Section 10.01 of the Official Plan.

Further, it is recommended that the adjacent landowner to the south of the applicant's property and to the east of a portion of the unopened municipal road allowance be contacted through the required process under the Municipal Act to determine if they have any comments or also wish to purchase a section of the unopened municipal road allowance.

Gary Merritt submitted a Road Naming Application to name a private road "Merritt Lane," with the written consent of 1346107 Ontario Inc. (Shawn Hall).

Mr. Merritt provided a brief history of the naming of the road on his property, "Merritt Lane." His grandfather, Judson Blake Merritt, purchased 100 acres from Johnny Sommerville and built the current cottage in 1927. Mr. Merritt is the third generation of the Merritt family to own the land and cottage. By next year, the Merritts will have owned the property for nearly 100 years. Mr. Merritt stated that it seems only fitting to name the road on his land "Merritt Lane."

The purpose of the proposed road naming is to assist with emergency response and to provide civic addressing for eleven water-access lots. This private road is accessed from Amorak Trail.

1346107 Ontario Inc. owns Part 1, Plan 42R-18296 (blue), and Gary Merritt owns Parts 1, 2, and 6, Plan 42R-22016 (yellow).

The private road will provide deeded access to Parts 1 and 2 on PSR-2324; Part 6 on Plan 42R-20061; Lot 1 on Plan 42M-518; and Parts 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 9, 10, and 11 on Plan 42R-22016, in the Township of McKenzie, now part of the Municipality of Whitestone.

The Public Notice for the proposed naming of a private road was posted on the municipality's website and bulletin board and on the property on September 3, 2025, and was also published in the Parry Sound North Star online newspaper on the same date.

Since the right-of-way (the proposed road to be named) is owned by Gary Merritt and 1346107 Ontario Inc., no Public Notice was sent to other property owners.

The fee for a Road Naming/Renaming Application is \$300.00 (non-refundable administration fee) and a \$1,000.00 security deposit to cover actual costs, such as online advertising expenses.







BACKGROUND / PURPOSE

The history of the application spans over 25 years and goes back before the Municipality of Whitestone was established on January 1, 2000.

Before January 1, 2000, land divisions applications were under the jurisdiction of the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing.


Draft plan of subdivision approval was given on October 2, 1997. The subdivision approval was for a nine-lot, water-access subdivision commonly known as the 'Merritt subdivision,' with the access arrangement at Parker's Bay. The access arrangement at Parker's Bay was a considerable distance from the Merritt subdivision.



LONGHORN SUBDIVISION

The Longhorn subdivision approval (by OMB decision) occurred on July 8, 1999 after the Merritt subdivision was submitted one year before the Municipality of Whitestone was established in 2000.

The Longhorn subdivision (Plan 42M-625) was located west of the Merritt subdivision and included road access along a new road from Wahwashkesh Road (Amorak Trail).



The establishment of the road access to the Longhorn Subdivision introduced a new possibility for the nine-lot, water-access lots in Merritt's subdivision to become road access.

There were multiple benefits from the Merritt's subdivision being converted to road access:

- More efficient;
- Increased public safety; and
- The inferior Parker's Bay lot could be abandoned.

FIRST CONSENT APPLICATION

The original application to grant rights-of-way to the Merritt's subdivision was filed in 2003.

The intertwining of the Amorak Trail and the simultaneous application for new lots to be severed from Amorak Trail created the perfect storm.


The first kilometre of Amorak Trail was assumed shortly after the newly established Municipality of Whitestone but the balance of the access road was below road standards for any type of maintenance purposes. Representatives in the Longhorn Subdivision expressed serious concerns over the marginal quality of the remaining portion of the access road and filed an appeal against the approval of the 2003 consent.

The representatives in the Longhorn Subdivision wanted assurances that users of Amorak Trail accessed via Merritt's road (as shown hatched over the Merritt lands in the sketch below) would contribute to maintenance costs.

Gary Merritt withdrew the consent, choosing not to incur the costs of an Ontario Municipal Board hearing.

PROPOSE OF THIS CONSENT APPLICATION

This application is a simplified version of the historic application that would grant access to eleven (11) water-access lots, including seven (7) in the Merritt's subdivision. The sketch below illustrates Merritt and 1346107 Ontario Inc. lands and the benefitting lots.

WHAT HAS CHANGED?

A number of factors has resurrected the consent to provide registered rights-of-way from Amorak Trail to the Merritt's subdivision. These factors are listed in no particular order, nor does any element hold more relevance than the others.

- Attempts to upgrade the full length of Amorak Trail have not been successful;
- Attempts to prevent access to the Merritt's subdivision have not occurred
- The Merritt's subdivision lot owners are now part of the private road program, have

contributed to maintenance fees;

- Benefitting lots now exclude island lots;
- 1346107 Ontario Inc. lands have now "freed up" to allow for the conveyance of rights-of-way;
- The ability to assign registered rights-of-way to the Merritt's subdivision has longterm benefits to the municipality and the private lot owners in terms of addressing and emergency service delivering;
- The uncertainty of the historic water access lands at Parker Bay will be eliminated;
 and
- Amendments to the *Planning Act* have eliminated appeals on Planning Board decisions.

There will be a "dangling issue" concerning the two island lots (Parts 1 & 2, Plan 42M-628) in the Merritt subdivision. These lots will simply be recognized as water access lots, with access available at the public landing.

RECOMMENDATION

That the proposed consent to grant rights-of-way to water access lots in Part of Lots 26, 27 and 28, Concessions 5 & 6 in the Geographic Township of McKenzie as applied for by Gary Merritt in Application No. B43/2024(W) be approved subject to the following conditions:

- 1. That the lots receive new 911 addresses on the private road;
- 2. Payment of all applicable planning board fees.



THE CORPORATION OF THE MUNICIPALITY OF WHITESTONE BY-LAW NO. 36-2025

Being a By-law to name a Private Road within the Corporation of Municipality of Whitestone and to Amend By-law No. 37-2024

WHEREAS Section 48 of the *Municipal Act*, 2001, S.O. c.25 as amended, authorizes the Council of the Corporation of the Municipality of Whitestone to name or change the name of a private road after giving public notice of its intention to pass the By-law;

AND WHEREAS pursuant to Section 61(2) of the *Municipal Act*, 2001, S.O. 2001, c. 25, as amended, if a local municipality has passed a By-law under Section 48 to name or change the name of a private road, the municipality may, at any reasonable time, enter upon land lying along the private road to install and maintain a sign setting out the name of the road;

AND WHEREAS notice of Council's intention to pass the By-law has been sent in accordance with the Procedures for Notices By-Law 04-2003;

AND WHEREAS Council deems it appropriate to pass a By-law under Section 48 of the *Municipal Act*, 2001, S.O. 2001, c. 25, as amended, to name a private road;

NOW THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Municipality of Whitestone enacts as follows:

- **1. THAT** the private road legally described as Part 1, Plan 42R-18296, and Parts 1, 2, and 6, Plan 42R-22016, geographic Township of McKenzie, now in the Municipality of Whitestone, is hereby named **Merritt Lane**; and
- **2. THAT** By-law No. 34-2002 is hereby amended by adding **Merritt Lane** to the list of roads within the municipality; and
- **3. THAT** this By-law shall come into force and take effect upon passage thereof.

WHEREAS new scientific evidence published since Health Canada's last assessment of glyphosate in 2017 has linked glyphosate-based end-use products to cancer, metabolic and neurological diseases, reproductive toxicity, and ecosystem harm; and

WHEREAS the Province of Quebec banned the use of glyphosate for forestry purposes in 2001 and replaced aerial herbicide spraying with manual forest thinning as a safer alternative forest management method; and

WHEREAS many residents have expressed concern regarding the potential environmental and public health risks associated with aerial spraying of glyphosate-based herbicides;

Subject: Support for Standardized Governance Models for Family Health Teams

Family Health Teams are a vital part of Ontario's healthcare system, particularly in rural and underserved communities like ours. These teams provide collaborative, team-based care that improves patient outcomes and relieves pressure on hospitals and emergency services.

Our municipality, like many others across the province, continues to invest local taxpayer dollars to support healthcare delivery — through physician recruitment efforts, infrastructure, and other community health initiatives. However, despite this investment and our community's reliance on these services, municipal and community voices are often underrepresented on the boards that govern Family Health Teams.

Currently, there is no mandatory governance framework for these boards, which has led to inconsistent representation and, in some cases, governance structures that do not reflect the communities they serve. This can lead to decisions being made without sufficient local input, oversight, or accountability.

The attached resolution calls on the Province of Ontario to implement a standardized and mandatory governance model for Family Health Teams, requiring that at least 50% of board members be community representatives. This would help ensure local interests are considered in decision-making, and strengthen transparency and trust in our healthcare system.

I recommend Council's support for this resolution and the forwarding of it to the appropriate provincial bodies and municipal partners.

Re: Landfill Compaction plan

Background

As indicated in their November 26, 2024 Technical Memorandum, Azimuth Environmental Consulting Inc. has indicated the York Street Landfill has a remaining lifespan of approximately 5 to 14 years. To extend the lifespan of both landfills, we will rent a compactor.

Analysis

Renting the compactor will allow us to:

- Compact the existing garbage and create more room for future disposal.
- Extend the operational life of both sites and improve overall efficiency.

At the Aulds landfill, this will also give us the opportunity to:

- Change the unloading areas to make them more user-friendly.
- Expand the separation area for brush and construction refuse.
- Support the production of mulch from brush, which could be offered to residents or used by Public Works for gardens, trails or a cleaner top dressing at the landfills.

This project is moving ahead on a quicker timeline than expected, as the company will be passing through our area the week of October 6, while delivering a machine that was rented to Indian River. I was notified of this schedule October 3. This provides us with a good opportunity to complete the work efficiently.

Costs will include the rental of the compactor and associated operational expenses. These will be covered under the current landfill operational budget.

I did reach out to a neighbouring municipality to coordinate this work, however received no response.

It is my opinion compaction will extend the lifespan of both landfills. As the operational lifespans of both sites decrease, we will evaluate viable solutions, including the potential transfer of material from the York Street landfill to the Auld's Road landfill.

Next Steps

- Compaction of garbage to create room for future disposal
- Evaluation of Azimuth's recommendations to identify actionable steps

WHEREAS on August 19, 2025, London Bridge Child Care Services Inc. advised that they will be closing all London Bridge Huron County Before and After School Programs, which affects Bluewater Coast Elementary School, Exeter Elementary School, and Precious Blood Catholic School; and

WHEREAS London Bridge Child Care Services Inc. sites ongoing staffing shortages in Huron County and across the province as the reason for this closure; and

WHEREAS the closure of the London Bridge Before and After School Programs, along with the Preschool Program at Bluewater Coast Elementary School, are creating a significant and immediate challenge for families with young children; and

WHEREAS the Council of the Municipality of Bluewater recognizes the importance of before and after school programs which provide a trusted, safe, and consistent environment for children outside of regular school hours – support that many working parents and guardians rely on to balance their jobs and family responsibilities; and

WHEREAS the Avon Maitland District School Board and the Huron-Perth Catholic District School Board do not operate licensed childcare programs, but partner with childcare providers to make use of school spaces where possible;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Council of the Municipality of Bluewater urges the Province of Ontario to immediately implement other service delivery models that are being successfully modeled elsewhere in the province to address the Early Childhood Educator shortage.

WHEREAS the Municipality of St.-Charles benefited from the Natural Gas Expansion Program Phase 2 expansion funding announced on June 9, 2021;

AND WHEREAS on August 13, 2025, the Municipality of St.-Charles was notified that the expansion project was cancelled due to mounting costs associated with inflation and difficult terrain;

AND WHEREAS Northern Ontario is on the cusp of substantial growth largely related to accessing critical minerals that will drive expansion in the mining sector;

AND WHEREAS with this economic expansion comes the need to support growth in traditional sectors such as farming, healthcare, forestry, and education;

AND WHEREAS employment growth will create increased demand for new housing developments to ensure that workers have a place to live, work, and play, all of which are closely tied to accessing natural gas as an affordable energy source and essential infrastructure for future residential, commercial, and industrial development;

AND WHEREAS current energy challenges force developers to explore alternatives such as oil and propane, which, while serving as temporary solutions, come with high costs and raise environmental concerns:

AND WHEREAS there is an urgent need for investment in sustainable energy solutions that are affordable, reliable, and environmentally responsible to support both current and future development;

AND WHEREAS natural gas is recognized as a clean, economical, and domestically sourced energy option that will lower energy costs for residents, farms, and businesses, while also enhancing opportunities for northern communities to grow by attracting new housing developments and commercial investment;

AND WHEREAS natural gas serves as a critical transition fuel that reduces reliance on higher-emission sources such as oil and propane, while enabling time and capacity for future investments in renewable and low-carbon energy;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED that Council for the Corporation of the Municipality of St.-Charles respectfully requests the Government of Ontario to support and approve the expansion of natural gas infrastructure to rural municipalities such as St.-Charles by undertaking a review of the Ontario Energy Board's Profitability Index model to incorporate a Northern Cost Adjustment that fairly accounts for the higher costs of construction in Northern Ontario caused by terrain challenges such as bedrock and wetlands, as well as the realities of distance, climate, and lower population density, to ensure that rural and northern communities are not disadvantaged in accessing natural gas infrastructure;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Municipality of St.-Charles requests the Province to embed northern natural gas expansion as a priority in Ontario's Integrated Energy Plan and regional economic growth strategies;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this Resolution be forwarded to FONOM, ROMA, AMO and all northern municipalities to build collective support for equitable natural gas expansion in Northern Ontario.


